Home Dialysis Treatment Options

Peritoneal Dialysis (PD)

- Treatment you may do almost anywhere
- Uses the lining of your own belly, the peritoneal membrane that covers your abdomen to filter your blood of toxins and extra fluids-hence no blood no needles
- Performed everyday manually (CAPD) or with a PD cycler at night while you sleep

Home Hemodialysis (HHD)

- Treatment in the comfort of your home during the day or overnight
- Follows the same treatment procedure as in-center through the removal ad cleaning of your blood
- Most patients do more frequent therapy for clinical benefits (5+)
- With doctors' approval may do solo or nocturnal with NxStage machine



Common Myths



Myth: I cannot do home dialysis by myself, I need to have a care-partner

Peritoneal Dialysis (PD)

- Typically, PD patients can perform therapy on their own
- No blood or needles are involved in PD. Generally, labs are taken monthly
- You will be trained to perform your PD dialysis without a carepartner. You will have additional training covering topics such as: ancillary supplies, taping techniques, recommendations to manage blood pressure and how to address potential emergencies

Home Hemodialysis (HHD)

- Home Hemodialysis patients that perform treatments during waking hours may not need a care partner
- The NxStage systems are the only machines in the US that are approved for solo/independent dialysis
- You will be trained to perform your dialysis treatments without a carepartner during waking hours. You will have additional training covering topics such as: ancillary supplies, taping techniques, recommendations to manage blood pressure and how to address potential emergencies



Myth: I cannot travel with my home dialysis machine

- With a little planning, you may be able to travel for business or pleasure, with both HHD and PD.
- Things to consider:
 - Travel prescription
 - Machine travel case
 - Ordering and packing supplies
 - Hotel coordination
 - Airline coordination





Myth: I cannot do home dialysis in my small living space or move it in my home

Why Home Dialysis

Both allow flexible schedules and may allow for better clinical benefits

PD

- Easy to learn
- No blood or needles
- Options to use a cycler at night or do CAPD exchanges
- Small portable machine for travel
- May have less diet restrictions
- May be healthier to receive transplant

HHD

- Patients train on their learning speed
- Many options for treatments including solo, nocturnal, extended, and more frequent treatments
- Options for a small portable machine (NxStage)
- Many clinical benefits reported for more frequent (5+ days)therapy
